The Grayson Theatre department is currently rehearsing the award-winning musical *SOUTH PACIFIC*, written by Rodgers and Hammerstein.

This musical has won numerous Tony awards on Broadway and has entertained audiences over the years. Songs such as “I’m Gonna Wash That Man Right Out of My Hair,” “There Ain’t Nothin’ Like a Dame,” and “Some Enchanted Evening” are among several in this show. The Grayson Theatre department is excited about this project for two reasons.

First, this show takes place during War World II, so this production will be a way to honor our local veterans and their families. *SOUTH PACIFIC* will open Oct. 12 at 7:30 p.m. at Cruce Stark and it

The second reason Grayson Theatre is excited about this show is the opportunity to include people in the community in this production. There is a cast of 24 actors, and within this cast, there are five actors who are not Grayson students. *Lisa Herbert*, the Grayson librarian, will portray the role of “Bloody Mary.” She will have the honor of singing the ballad “Bali Hai” and “Happy Talk.”

The Grayson College Theater Arts department, in an effort to continue improve safety and being better prepared for an emergency, addressed concern with an overhead cat walk on August 30, 2012. To understand the problems, they teamed up with the students

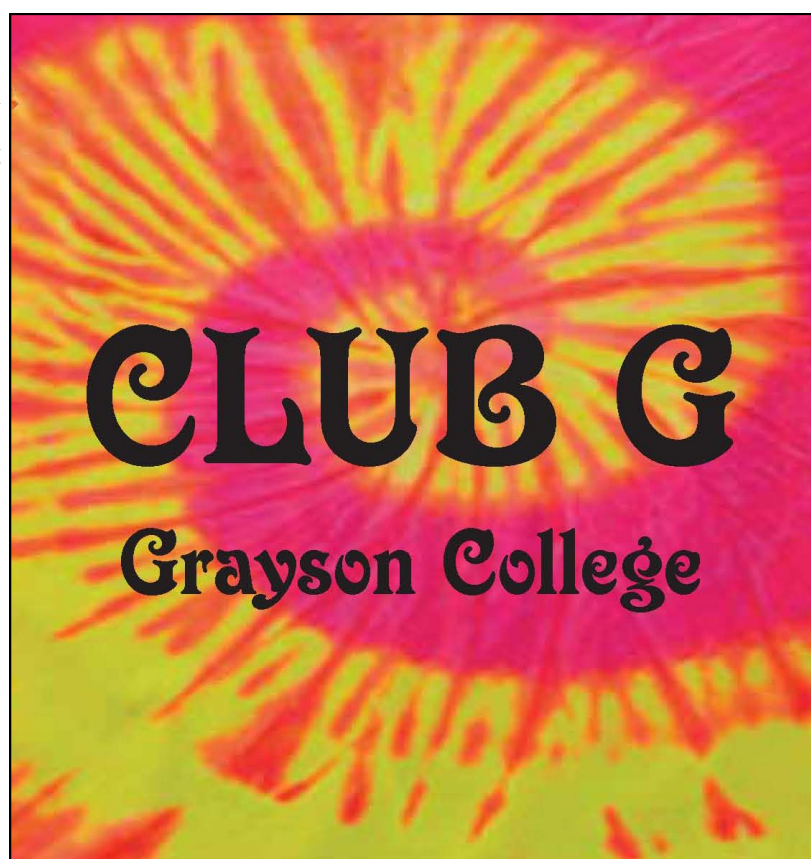
and instructors from the paramedic program.

Using the medical manikins placed in the same harnesses, everyone got a real-life look at the problems and reasoning behind safety procedures.

Before the theater students arrived, an emergency incident planning session was held, allowing paramedic students a chance to problem solve an unusual but very possible inci-



Theater and paramedics students “assisting” manikin

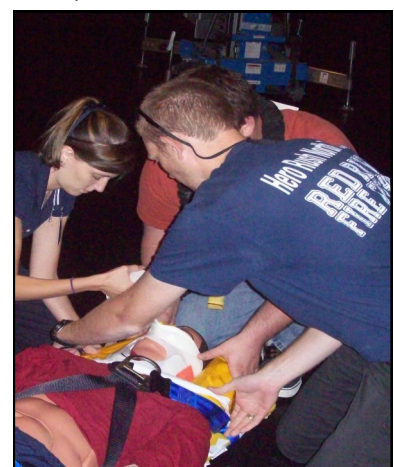


dent that they could come upon. After a strategy was developed and practiced, the theater arts students got a chance not only to see the manikin fall but had a chance to see it saved only by its harness and had the chance to learn and participate in the rescue, using a genie hydraulic platform.

The scenario was played out as if it was a real-life incident, with paramedic students arriving with their classroom equipment to take over the treatment. This was great because it gave a fresh look at the jobs of a paramedic and all the care that has to be given to patients in those circumstances.

“It was a great experience for me, and I would enjoy do-

ing more activities like this one to help me and my fellow classmates learn outside of the classroom,” said Messie Rhone.

When do I get my financial aid zero?

Financial aid disbursement dates are calculated using the census date of the semester. Census date this semester was September 12th making the first disbursement September 28th.

After this date, disbursements are calculated every two weeks. If you did not complete your applications, accept your aid and/or did your Entrance Counseling and MPN by the census date, then your first disbursement will come two to three weeks after you complete everything.

Why does my loan say

If you have applied for a loan, accepted it, and completed the MPN and Entrance Counseling but your loan still shows zero, don't panic. The Financial Aid Office is not allowed to ask for the funds from the federal government until 7-10 days before disbursement. Once the Business Office receives the funds, it will show up in your Campus Connect.

How much will I get?

On the first disbursement, any Pell Grant funds remaining will be "paid" to you as well as half of the semesters' award in loans. The second disbursement, which

is October 26 this semester, will pay the remaining half of your loan balance. All students who borrow loans are encouraged to start tracking their debt using www.nsls.ed.gov while in school. NSLDS is also a great way to stay informed after you complete your program or stop attending college.

No one in the Financial Aid office can tell you the exact dollar amount you will receive in your disbursement. We have no way to know how much you will spend in tuition, fees and what you have charged at the Grayson Book Store. But, we are happy to help you learn how to see what you were awarded on your Campus Connect.

Once your classes and fees are paid by your financial aid, you will see

credits on your pay/review account in Campus Connect. After everything you owe has been paid for, you will see an ending net balance as a credit on your pay/review account. This is the money you will get in your disbursements. For those of you who have set up a direct deposit, you will see DD in front of your

"refund" amount.

We encourage all students to start budgeting before college, especially those of you on financial aid. There are many great tools provided by the Department of Education at www.ed.gov and www.studentaid.ed.gov. As mentioned before, you may track your loans and balances at www.nsls.ed.gov. Show me the money

Applying for financial aid

When you filled out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), it immediately went to the Department of Education for initial processing. When that processing is complete, it is sent to the Financial Aid office at the school or schools that you requested it to go to.

When the Financial Aid Office receives this information, it is then able to use the information from the FAFSA to determine whether you are eligible to receive any federal, state, or institutional financial

aid. All types of aid are considered and reviewed in order to put together an individualized "award package."

In some cases, the Department of Education may select your FAFSA for "verification." This does not indicate that you have done anything wrong. It is simply a way for the federal government to run some checks and balances on all of the applications they receive.

If your FAFSA is selected for verification, you will receive a notice from our office, telling you exactly which documents you will need to supply to our office in order to complete the process.

We notify you in the following ways: you

will first see statements, in red on your Campus Connect. These documents are needed, and you will also receive a letter in the mail stating which documents are needed. The most important thing for you to know is that we cannot process your financial aid until we receive all of the requested documents and have processed them, sent the results to the Department of Education, and received the completed Verification back from them. Once confirmation is received from the Department of Education, we will process your "award package" in the order in which it was received.

As soon as your award package has been completed, you will be able to see your awards on your Campus Connect, which can be found on the Grayson

College Portal at <http://mypage.grayson.edu/ics>.

You will then need to go to the Financial Aid tab of your Campus Connect and choose Aid Online Acceptance on the left hand side of the page to ACCEPT, DECLINE, or REDUCE your awards. Please be sure you do this every semester before the "Payment Deadline," as shown in the Academic Calendar of the Grayson College Class Listings for that semester.

If you accept a Federal Student Loan, you will need to immediately go to www.studentloans.gov and complete your Master Promissory Note and your Entrance Counseling.

What kind of financial aid do I have?

Most financial aid is tied to the number of

credit hours that you attend each semester.

Pell Grant

If you see a PELL grant listed in your award package, the "Award Amount" listed is the amount you would receive if you attended a minimum of 12 hours. If you attend less than 12 hours, the Pell will adjust downward to three-quarter, half or less than half time. You may attend as little as 3 credit hours and receive some Pell if you are otherwise eligible.

Other Grants

If you see other grants listed in your package, the dollar amount will usually stay the same no matter how many hours you are attending.

Loans

Warning: You must be attending a minimum of

six (6) credit hours to receive any type of loan. If at any time during the semester you drop below six credit hours, you will lose your loan. You must complete, sign, and submit your Master Promissory Note and complete and submit your Entrance Counseling in order to receive your loan.

Scholarships, exemptions, outside billings and other types of financial aid

The requirements for scholarships, exemptions, outside billings and other types of financial aid are too varied to list here. Please make sure you understand the type of aid you are expecting to receive and come speak to one of our Financial Aid Advisors if you have any questions.

Trip Lee, a Christian rapper, has done something that is uncommon for rappers to do: write a book on living the good life.

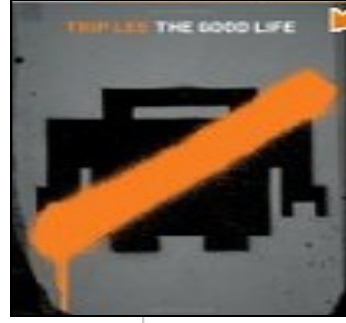

therapeutic listening.

Counseling is a chance to talk confidentially with someone who can help you learn coping skills and new ways of looking at situations. Some students benefit from one or two sessions of problem-solving, while some concerns may warrant multiple counseling sessions.

Almost anyone can benefit from counseling. College students, in particular, may face these common concerns:

- Depression
- Anxiety
- Stress
- Substance abuse
- Problems with eating and body image

All counseling sessions are confidential, just between you and your counselor, who will not disclose personal information shared during your sessions with professors or parents. Only you can give consent for us to release any information about you. Any

information that you provide, as well as counseling records, are strictly confidential, except in life-threatening situations or in cases of suspected child or elder abuse.

- Are accepting of cultural differences, including race, ability, gender, religious affiliation and sexual orientation.
- Will maintain the highest ethical and legal standards of confidentiality.
- Will be open to discussing any of your concerns.
- Are interested in listening to you.

Our Internship Student Counselors are here for you.

Currently-registered students can come to the Grayson College Counseling Center to schedule an appointment.

At the first appointment, the counselor and student will decide together what type of counseling will be most beneficial. Students requiring immediate help can be seen on an emergency basis on the same day.

This program is very important to this area and gives our kids a place to learn lessons on and off the football field. So, please come out and help support the kids and the Salvation Army Boys and Girls Club.

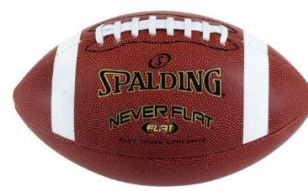
