College Welcomes Students





Concealed Handguns on College Campuses Cody Lang

Concealed handguns are always a controversial topic anywhere one goes it seems. Some people believe it's our right as citizens to carry concealed handguns, some people believe it's more dangerous than having an unarmed population, and some do not even know the laws of carrying a concealed handgun due to apathy. However starting this fall, any student 21 years of age with a Concealed Handgun License (CHL) will be able to carry their handgun on a university campus. (Students cannot carry concealed handguns on community college campuses until next fall.) CHL classes give people hands-on training in carrying handguns, but some citizens believe that training may not be enough. Some believe CHL instructors do not give the students in their classes the amount of training they need to really un-.derstand how to properly handle the firearm

Andy MacPherson, Police Chief of Grayson College for 13 years, believes there are "pros and cons" to the law. "It's dangerous for those that may not be familiar with carrying weapons. Those who do carry concealed handguns will try ",to respond and go look for the bad guys themselves

My sixteen-year-old son was frightened" and worried when I told him about signing him up for college in the fall," said Wendy Klenn, a homeschooling mom of five. "He isn't quite sure if he is ready," she went on .to say

he states. Giles Brown, Grayson College Vice President, agrees with MacPherson in a way. Brown sees a potential benefit to the law. "However," he states, "not handling it correctly could be a major problem." Michael Lang, proud father of two college students, is not as concerned, provided the student carrying is licensed. "It's my opinion that if someone has a license to concealed carry, they should be allowed to .do so everywhere they go," Lang states Taking precautions in enforcing the new law is something that everyone faculty, staff, and students--is concerned about for the college. Many citizens today feel as if we should have stricter gun laws rather than letting young adults carry firearms. To protect the safety of the students, knowing that there will be firearms on campus, MacPherson states that education will be key about concealed carry on campus, including online and face-to-face classes that "will help the students prepare for the new law." A study group formed by Grayson president Jeremy McMillen will be making recommendations in October about how to implement the new law at Grayson next year. Lang says his children are already aware of the campus carry law and its .provisions

All of these precautions will mean nothing, though, without a plan to put them into action. "Face-to-face education about firearms, offering classes about firearms, and doing a section on College 101 [the Grayson College orientation course]," is what MacPherson states are the campus police station plans on taking action on these precautions. Brown states that Grayson has studied how others states have implemented similar laws and has even had a concealed handgun instructor explain training options for the campus community


ous intent of the law; however, some faculty, staff, students, and citizens see this law as more dangerous than anything. They see it as a way for students and others to bring unlicensed firearms onto campus and do whatever they want to do with that weapon. MacPherson does not believe the law will make colleges safer or more dangerous. Brown, though, cautions that "if handled correctly, the law could be great; if handled incorrectly, the law could be very dangerous." Lang feels the law will not be a deterrent but a definite benefit. "The law will not keep the bad guys from bringing their guns and killing people in those locations. Therefore, having students on campus with concealed weapons could help protect students and save lives," he .states



When this law is viewed from the perspectives of different people who will be directly affected by it, one sees the variety of opinions people have. Some people cannot wait for the law to take effect, while others are terrified of it and think it is a terrible idea. For now, there is no way to tell whether the law will succeed in keeping campuses safer or not. Putting the law into effect will be the only way to find out. There is a lot riding on how this law will work, and many people are anticipating the .outcome

Music on Main is an event held in downtown Denison, coordinated by the Main Street Organization, with Donna Dow as the primary overseer. This communityminded event is something to get everyone out and about and bring the city together. This means not only that the Denison community gets closer but also that surrounding local businesses benefit from this stimulation in the downtown .economic activity

Music on Main originated in 2002 and has been successful from the start. Typically, Music on Main schedules local original or cover bands, a generous act that lets local artists get stage experience .in front of family and friends

Within the last two years, Music on Main has decided to broaden their horizons and has scheduled bigger-name bands. Receiving the Levitt Amp. Foundation Grant, which was only awarded to 12 cities in 2015 and 20 cities in 2016, has enabled this revamp to take place. Cody Canada and The Departed was one of the bigger names to grace the Downtown Denison Inc. stage last summer, and, June 2, Whiskey Myers performed .in the fun downtown venue

Concerts take place every Friday during the summer?, with varying start times. Opening acts usually start around 7:30 p.m., and the main act normally starts around 8:00 p.m.. Seating is limited, so the audience should bring their own lawn chairs to set up in the barricaded .street

If you go to any Music on Main production, it is guaranteed that you will see a variety of age groups. "The people are definitely fun," notes Brinton Vaughn, Music on Main attendee. "It's a fun time to listen to music with a bunch of your friends. We ate hot dogs and it was a good time," he recalls. From young families eager to spend a night enjoying the entertainment to teenagers enjoying time with their friends, Music on Main is appropriate for any age group. Don't worry about eating dinner before you go, either. Because there is such a large audience drawn to the concerts, (normally around 700 people attend, and around 1500 are projected to attend Whiskey Myers), some downtown businesses and restaurants stay open later. "[Donna Dow] coordinates vendors to come down and set up. They have food, drink, and sno-cone vendors, as well as craft vendors," notes William Myers, a volun-.teer who helps set up the concerts Music on Main is the definition of a fun, easy-going Friday night. "It's a good active deal, a lot of publicity because of it. People like it and come down there and chill with their family. It's open container, so some people like being able to bring alcoholic beverages in the park and drink and listen to some music. It's real cheap entertainment for people," explains Myers. "Three main objectives [in which technology is] mainly hurting us are physical health, mental health, and human interaction," said Brenda Ruby, a retired elementary teacher. Ruby couldn't stress enough how ridiculous our technology addiction is getting. "Students, adults, and even toddlers," she stated, are glued to their devices and addicted to the digital world.

The technology is corrupting all ages of life, from the youngest to the oldest generations. But we aren't realizing some of the issues that occur. Doctors, teachers, parents, and colleagues have seen direct evidence of this corruption as we grow and as our demand grows for our devices. The longterm effects of technology's influence haven't necessarily shown themselves yet due to the fact that digital technology really has just taken off over the last ten years, although the short-term effects have been highly visible.

The effects of technology aren't just on people who constantly use their digital devices. A study shows that just a couple of hours a day looking at a screen can affect a person the same as an internet addict is affected, according to Common Sense Media. Ruby claimed that she has seen her students year by year gain weight throughout the year. She said, "My kids choose to go to the computer labs on Fridays rather than outside. I don't know if they get any exercise at home, but at school they sit. By the handbook, I was not allowed to force them on to the playground."

Human relationships have been transformed through digital technology. Humans hardly communicate during a lunch date or through a walk in the park any more. The new preferred gadget of communication is a mobile phone. One can text, email, and even facetime over this device. Dr. Jenifer Dockray, a family psychiatrist, claimed that face-to-face human interaction has been outdated. She said, "Technology, phones, iPods and even gaming systems have completely ruined the physical face-to-face social skills. I have seen so many patients

that aren't getting along due to the poor social collaboration they have with each other. This is caused by their technology that they use daily." In discussing this topic, Dr. Dockray seemed to gradually get angry; she is very upset with everyone who is constantly texting or checking email. She tried explaining how much better life would be if we took a break from the digital world now and then.

Due to the increase in communications online, relationships have taken a beat down. People show fewer emotions or feelings. Technology is ruining our personalities. "Not only is it destroying our personalities, but it is destroying our society and everything about it," emphasized Dr. Dockray.

Technology exacerbates stress, anxiety, isolation, weight gain, carpal tunnel, strained vison and even affects relationships. Some people get so bad they need medical help separating themselves from a digital device, noted Dr. Dockery.

Digital technology isn't the only type of technology that has negatively affected humans. Gerald Stewart, a manager of a trucking company in Florida, described the changes he has seen throughout the company due to advancements of technology, especially about the effect technology has on a corporation and realworld scenarios. He said, "Over the last 12 years, we have had an employee loss of about 25 percent." He added that, "We still have about 3000 workers state wide, but that 25 percent of employees were laid off due to technology advancements."

Those workers were the bread winners for their family, but now they have been "kicked to the curb" because of technology. Stewart said, "This is why poverty and the number of jobless Americans is a big deal nowadays. It's because of the stupid technology they are bringing to corporations." Technology is gradually destroying us, according to Ruby, Dr. Dockray, and Stewart. Although it's supposed to be improving our lives, with technology, the quality of our human life is slowly deteriorating. "It's only going to get worse," Stewart claimed.
